

A Lifetime of Giving

Donor Profile: Charles Campbell

Recently, we were stunned to learn of a \$100,000 bequest from a Hundred Club supporter. Charles E. "Chuck" Campbell, 73, was a former state trooper and a member of The Hundred Club since 2000. The well-known Boston consultant passed away unexpectedly on March 3, 2021.

Like many of our supporters, Mr. Campbell understood first-hand the dangerous environment within which our police and firefighters work. He became a state trooper after serving in the Vietnam War. He went on to complete his studies, which included a master's in counseling, and entered corporate HR. For the past 28 years, he owned and acted as principal of Argyle Consultants, an HR consulting and coaching firm. He is also known for establishing the Senior Human Resources Network (SHRN).

Trumbull Street Fire October 1, 1964

Five Boston firefighters lost their lives when the front wall of a vacant 4-story toy factory located at 34 Trumbull St. collapsed.

- Firefighter Robert J. Clougherty
- Firefighter Francis L. Murphy

Patrolman Walter P. Langley Mansfield Police

Patrolman Langley was a Vietnam War veteran and was the recipient of the Purple Heart. He had served with the Mansfield Police Department for 8 years and had previously served with the Kingston Police Department.



October 2, 1983

Mansfield Police Officer
Walter Langley was struck
and killed by a drunk driver
while investigating a car
parked on the side of Route
140. The driver who struck
him was arrested and
charged with vehicular
homicide. He was survived
by his wife and 5 children.




October 7, 1969

Billerica Police Officer Kenneth Collins suffered fatal head injuries after responding to a fight at a local bar.



October 13, 2000

Somerville Firefighter died of a heart attack after responding to emergency calls. He served in the military during the Cuban missile crisis. Somerville Fire Department awarded him its Medal of Honor posthumously.



October 16, 1970

Lt. Joseph J. Downing died in the line of duty from injuries sustained while engaged in fighting a taxicab fire in South Boston on Sept. 19, 1970. Ironically, his unit would not normally have answered the alarm on Emerson Street, but did so because the regularly assigned unit was out on another call. Furthermore, he would not have been involved in the 4:26 p.m. call had he not reported two hours earlier than his regular 6 p.m. shift to relieve another officer. He left behind a wife and 3 children.



October 20, 1987

Fall River Lieutenant Paul

Bernard was an 11 Year

Veteran and died when he

ran out of air at a fire on 749

Quequechan Street.



Roy Joseph Sergei had served with the Bostor Police Department for

their three children.




October 28, 1991

Boston Police Officer
Jeremiah Hurley was killed
while investigating a call
regarding a suspicious
package. During the
investigation the package
exploded, killing him and
wounding the other officer
on the scene. The bomb had
been attached to the bottom
of a car and fell off in the
driveway.



October 30, 1973
Springfield Police Officer
Mawaka who was killed in
a motorcycle accident
while on duty. He was



November 4, 1975

Police Chief Francis Pisani, an 18-year veteran of the police department, suffered an apparent heart attack as he left his Somerville home struck by a hit and run driver while returning to the station at the end of his shift. The driver was never found. Officer Mawaka had served with the Springfield Police Department for 9 years.

complications from Hepatitis-C. Bennett was inadvertently punctured by a needle while rendering assistance at a medical emergency on October 15, 1987. to inspect Cambridge polling places. Following his death in 1975, the then Cambridge City Manager James L. Sullivan, declared a five day period of mourning



November 6, 1975

Boston Police Sergeant Richard Halloran was shot and killed while investigating a suspicious vehicle in the area of Bremen Street and Neptune Road.



November 13, 2019

Worcester Fire Lt. Jason Menard and his family. Menard, was assigned to Ladder 5, Group 2 at the McKeon Road Fire Station. On the morning of 11/13/19 Menard and fellow firefighters rushed into a burning threedecker at 7 Stockholm St. As flames overtook the third floor, Menard pushed fellow firefighter Chris Pace out a window to safety before losing his own life in the blaze. He left behind his wife and children.



October 6, 2022

Randolph Police Lt. Chaplin was a 25-year member of the Randolph Police Department. His dedication to service and the law enforcement profession was always at the forefront. He leaves behind a wife and 2 children.
