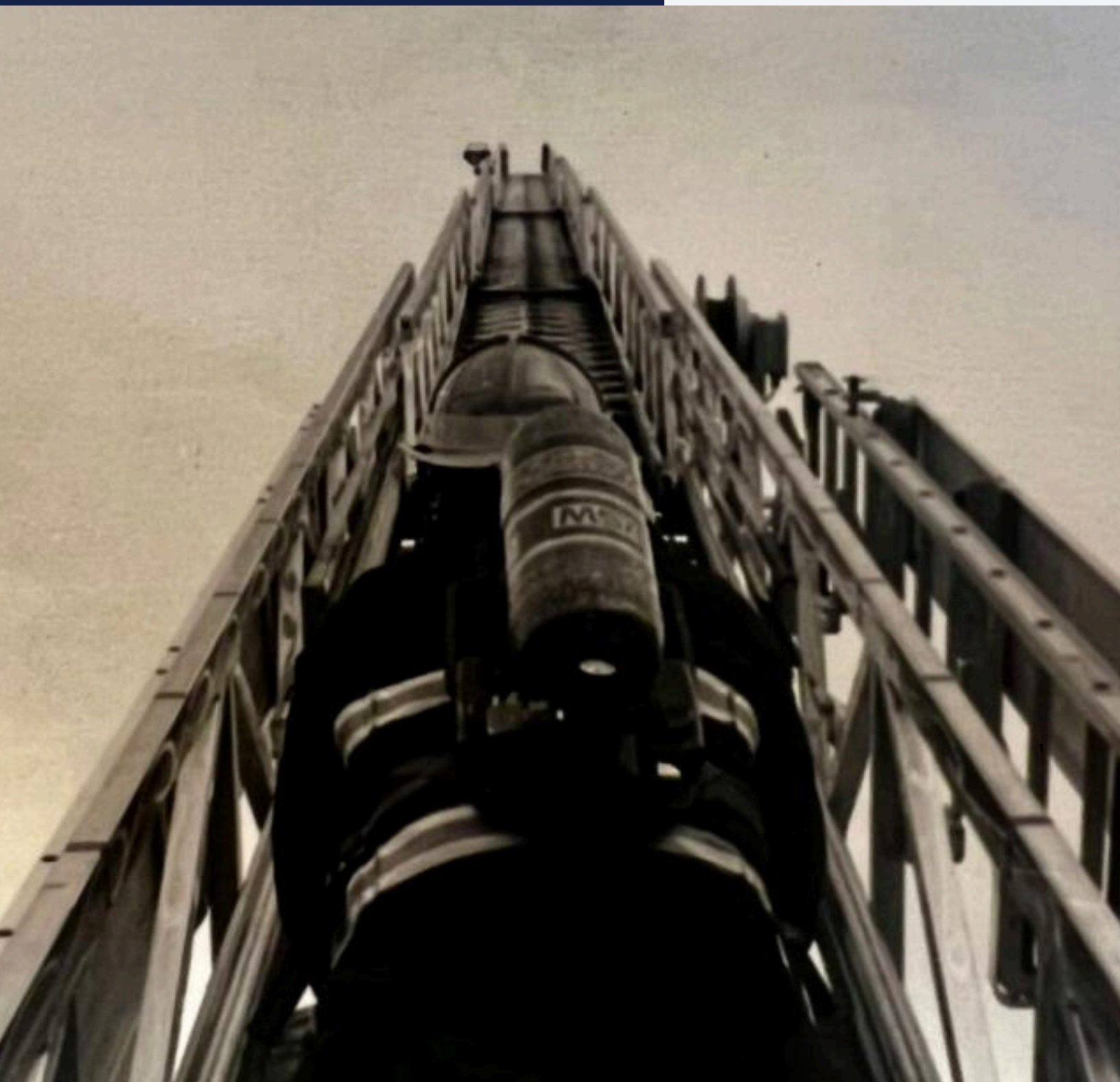

# Cover Photo: The Climb

---

**Ava Roy, our cover photographer, was only nine when her father, Worcester Firefighter Christopher Roy, died in the line of duty.**

Now 16, Ava was given a simple assignment in her photography class last year: take a few pictures and turn them in. But surrounded by classmates photographing horses, sunsets, and perfect suburban stills, she wanted something different — something with meaning.

“I thought, I have access to the fire station,” she says. “No one else will have that.” She asked her grandparents to take her, and firefighters — including some not even on shift — showed up when they heard Chris’s daughter was coming by. They put on gear, raised the ladder of Ladder 4, the truck her father once drove, and invited her to climb on top of the rig to take her shot.

The moment comforted her more than she expected. “It brought me back to being little, when my dad brought me there,” Ava says. “Those guys were like uncles to me. It made me feel safe again.”

In the darkroom at school, while developing film by hand, her teacher saw something in the image and encouraged her to submit it to a regional

competition. The photo — a firefighter climbing the ladder, framed in stark contrast — was titled “The Climb.”

Out of 300 student submissions across New England, Ava earned an Honorable Mention — a rare recognition for a sophomore in a competition typically awarded to seniors. The photo now lives online at Ana Maria College’s New England Secondary School Design Competition, and in the hearts of everyone who sees it.



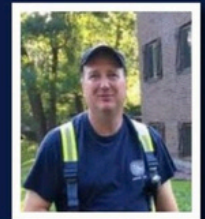

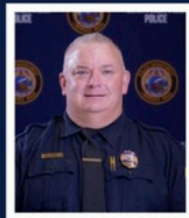

#### Immediate Assistance

When a family loses a loved one, the impact is immediate and overwhelming. In those first hours and days, there is no time to prepare for the financial strain that follows such a loss. The Hundred Club provides direct financial assistance quickly, helping families cover urgent expenses and begin to stabilize during an unimaginably difficult time.

#### Ongoing Stability

Support does not end after the initial response. In many ways, that is when the longer journey begins.

Each year looks different. Some years bring moments of healing and reconnection. Others, like 2025, bring a tragically high number of losses that deeply affect our entire community. This means that year over year, our support evolves with each family's needs. This includes access to mental health and wellness resources, opportunities for personal enrichment, and meaningful connections with others who understand their experience. While participation in enrichment programs may vary year to year, the importance of these opportunities remains constant. They offer space for healing, growth, and moments of light in the midst of grief.

Our scholarship program for children who have lost a parent in the line of duty supports students pursuing college, vocational training, and other post-secondary pathways. For many families, this support provides both opportunity and reassurance during an uncertain time. It reflects a belief that even in the face of loss, there is a future worth investing in.

# Scholarship Impact

## Continuing the Promise Through Education

---

When a firefighter or police officer makes the ultimate sacrifice, the impact is felt not only in the moment, but for years to come. For surviving children like Ryan and Emily Deschenes, who lost their father Jeffrey Deschenes in the line-of-duty in May 2025 (North Andover Fire), that loss can shape every milestone, including the path they choose after high school graduation.

That is why the scholarships provided by the Hundred Club are so important. Ryan, a recent high school graduate and Hundred Club scholarship recipient, graduated from the Heavy Construction Academy. Through hands-on training, classroom instruction, and real-world application, he gained not only technical skills, but confidence and resilience. Today, he is pursuing a career operating heavy equipment and hopes to combine those skills with his welding experience to build a strong future. Emily, also a scholarship recipient, graduated from Southern NH University in August 2025 with a Bachelor of Arts degree and was consistently on the Honor Roll and President's List for her strong academic performance.

## New England Police Benevolent Association

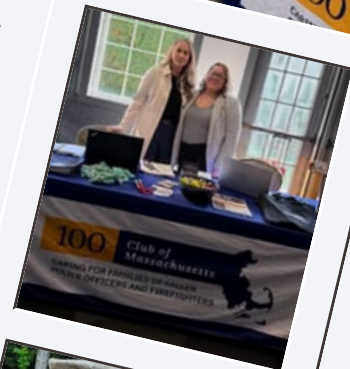

## Massachusetts Firefighter of the Year Awards

The Hundred Club of Massachusetts was proud to stand alongside the courageous men and women honored at this year's Massachusetts Firefighter of the Year Awards.

More than 170 firefighters were recognized for acts of heroism and service across the Commonwealth – including Chicopee Captain Katie Collins-Kalbaugh, who received the Norman Knight Award for Excellence in Community Service, named in honor of a Hundred Club founder and lifelong advocate for Massachusetts firefighters.

## The Hundred Club Annual Holiday Party

The annual holiday party has long been one of the Hundred Club's most meaningful traditions. Each year, surviving families, members, and supporters from across Massachusetts gather for an afternoon centered on connection, reflection, and community.

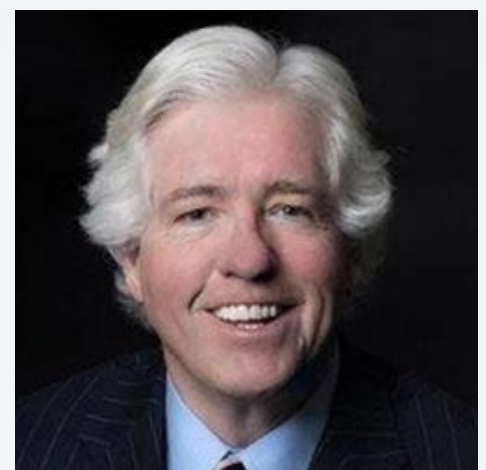
